CONTRA COSTA COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY TO CELEBRATE OPENING OF ITS NEW HOME IN MARTINEZ ON APRIL 20

he Contra Costa County History Center will celebrate its recent move to 724 Escobar Street in Martinez with a Grand Opening on Saturday, April 20, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

County Supervisor Federal Glover and Contra Costa County Historical Society President John Burgh, together with other members of the historical societycs board, will kick off the event at 10:30 a.m. with a ribbon cutting to mark the opening of the history center's new location, as well as the beginning of the history center's 31st year in existence.

"The Contra Costa County History Center has been in existence for 30 years, and I am delighted to be in a position to oversee this transition to a larger and more expanded facility," said Burgh. "We welcome this opportunity to share with county residents the historical resources that the history center has to offer."

The ribbon cutting will be followed by tours of the history center at one-half-hour intervals



and a chance to view the facility's new exhibit — *Contra Costa County: More than the Opposite Coast*, curated by Beverly Lane and Andrea Blachman. Refreshments and activities for children and adults will also be available, and the book store will be open.

Contra Costa County's history is a microcosm of California's. The exhibit reflects this fact with information about the original Indian tribes, Spanish exploration, Rancho era and the Gold Rush population explosion. The agriculture, industries, and World War II county transformations are featured. Seldom-seen maps and a section on the county's 40-year flamboyant sheriff R.R. Veale get special attention.

The Early Ranches of Pinole

The Early Ranches of Pinole will be the program at the Pinole Historical Society's next membership meeting on Friday, May 17, from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in conference rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building.

The upper and lower Pinole Valley attracted 19th-century settlers whose livelihood depended on farming and ranching. The geography of rolling hills and fertile soil produced a ranching culture that *Continued on next page*

The Early Ranches of Pinole

Continued from front page drove Pinole's economy before and after the town's incorporation in 1903.

Cattle drives and caravans of hay and grain wagons from the valley hinterland were familiar sights for Pinoleans. This yearly parade came along Tennent Avenue through downtown to the bay-front railroad, warehouse, and wharf complex called Pinole Landing. The practice continued

until the mid 1940s and 1950s.

Surrounding dairy farms provided locals with milk, butter and cheese. However, in the 1920s and 1930s, tomatoes became the new cash crop of the Pinole Valley. By the 1950s and 1960s, the tomato fields and cattlecovered hillsides were replaced with homes as Pinole became part of the new suburbia.

The streets of Pinole are a roll call of hard-working pioneer

ranch names - Martinez, Tennent, Fernandez, Ellerhorst, Fitzgerald, Simas, Rose, Faria, Scanlan, Buckley, Silva, and Mohring.

PROGRAMS AT ROSIE THE RIVETER/WWII HOME FRONT NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Speaker series explores legacy of American WWII homefront

he National Park Service is hosting a series of guest speakers who will explore the

legacy of the American World War II homefront on Saturday afternoons this spring.

Saturday, April 27 at 2 p.m.

- Location: Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park Visitor Center, 1414 Harbour Way South, Suite 3000, Richmond
- **Program:** "From A Silk Cocoon" — screening of an Emmy Award-winning film.

Guest: Dr. Satsuki Ina

This docu-drama chronicles the wartime story of Satsuki Ina, Professor Emeritus in the School of Education at CSU-Sacramento and a psychotherapist, whose parents refused to sign the so-called loyalty questionnaire imposed by the US government. Dr. Ina will discuss the long-term consequences of the Japanese American incarceration during World War II and its relevance for social justice issues today.

- **Program:** "Caring for Rosies's and California's Children"
- Guest: Dr. Natalie Fousekis

The program will include a short film of interviews



with teachers and former students who were involved in the federally funded childcare system that emerged in the San Francisco Bay Area during World War II.

The film was produced by the Regional Oral History Office at UC Berkeley.

Following the film, Dr. Natalie Fousekis will discuss this crossclass and cross-race group of women who saved public child care in California from World War II to the 1970s. Dr. Fousekis is Associate Professor of History and Director of the Center for Oral and Public History at California State University-Fullerton, and author of the recent book, "Demanding Child Care."

TWO NEW DOCUMENTARIES BEING SHOWN DAILY


A new documentary film called "The War At Home" is being shpwn daily at the Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park. The 25-minute film screens hourly at the park's Visitor Education Center, starting at 11 a.m.. The last screening is at 4 p.m. It's shown seven days a week.

"The War At Home," produced in collaboration between the National Park Service and Signature Communications, uses oral histories, archival materials, and personal diaries to illustrate the diversity and complexity of the World War II homefront experience, from the perspective of a number of real people who lived in different cities across the United States.

Another 16-minute documentary film, "Home Front Heroes," which outlines the history of defense manufacturing in Richmond, during World War II, is also screened regularly, alternating with "The War At Home." You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.






