CITY TAKES FIRST STEP TOWARD PINOLE MUSEUM

inole has a very interesting history. Interesting characters have lived here. Interesting things happened here—and continue to happen here.

Nevertheless, there are generations of Pinole residents who know nothing about their city's history, in large part because there's no place for them to go to learn about it.

The Pinole Historical Society has done its best to fill this void by publishing books, conducting walking tours and interviews, and sponsoring events.

We have a website, a Facebook page, and we publish two newsletters — one a quarterly printed newsletter focusing on the city's history and the other a monthly electronic newsletter focusing on history events in the city and area.

Local history isn't part of our schools' curricula, so the PHS tries to introduce our young people (and not-so-young people) to our city's heritage via books, tours, lectures, and community The Faria House, 2100 San Pablo Avenue. Photo by Larry Neptune.

But, the city lacks a museum people can visit to see our city's history on display.

The society's mission is to promote awareness and appreciation of history through preservation and education, and chronicle the city's heritage for current and future generations. This is what a museum can do.

On March 1, 2016, the Pinole City Council agreed to have the Faria House appraised for possibly buying it and establishing a city museum in the building.

The Faria House was moved to its downtown location at 2100 San Pablo Avenue in 2005 from the site now occupied by the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building.

At that time, it was a Redevelopment project, and the then-city council planned that it would become a museum to house and display the many artifacts that document our history.

But the state, in dissolving and taking over all Redevelopment assets, now controls it and other

Continued from previous page such properties. If the city, or anyone else, wants to buy it at market value, the state will get most of the proceeds. Thus the appraisal, a necessary first step.

Do we need a community museum?

Did we need a library when we forked up the money to build it?

What about the new Pinole Skate Park for those who enjoy that activity?

Our Community Playhouse is undergoing an interior rebuilding to better serve its audiences.

The Senior Center opened in 1990 to meet senior citizens' activity needs, and is undergoing a quarter-million-dollar re-roofing project.

The money spent on these projects demonstrates how the city addresses the lifestyles and interests of all people who live in Pinole.

The society's goals are shared by many citizens, and the Pinole City Council desires and intends to satisfy another segment of the local population by preserving and protecting the city's heritage.

While it's still early in the process, the council's action is the first step in what the PHS hopes will result in a community museum to house the many artifacts that document our wonderful city's history.

DEAN ALLISON October 28, 1956 — March 4, 2016

Dean Allison, former Public Works Director of the City of Pinole and a lifetime member of the Pinole Historical Society, died March 4. He was 59.

Dean was well-liked and respected by everyone with whom he came in contact — elected officials, fellow engineers, and members of the community.

"Dean Allison stood for all that was good," said Pinole Mayor Roy Swearingen. "He was always willing to help everyone in our community.

"I met Dean nine years ago and instantly bonded with him as a friend.

He felt very good about his new career opportunity in San Rafael. I will miss our Friday evening recaps of the week's activities."

Dean was Pinole's Public Works Director from October 2005 to September 2015, when he left to take a similar position for the City of San Rafael.

"Dean embodied everything a Public Works Director should be—he was a technical expert with an exceptional ability to collaborate; he could relate to absolutely everyone and each individual would walk away feeling heard and understood and impressed with Dean," said San Rafael City Manager Jim Schutz.

Dean, a native of Dobbs Ferry, NY, graduated from the University of California at Irvine with an MBA. He also held two bachelor's degrees, one from University of Buffalo in civil engineering and the other from the State University of New York at Oneonta in physics. He loved baseball and was a loyal New York Mets fan.





Beginning April 1, Save Mart S.H.A.R.E.S. became Shares powered by eScrip, requiring S.H.A.R.E.S. cardholders to register online their card and/or phone number along with personal contact information.

At its March 9 board meeting, the PHS board voted to not enroll in the new eScrip program.

Doing so would create opportunity for eScrip to deliver product promotions and program information to those who register, something the PHS board does not favor for its member/supporters.

May 14 Spring book sale


The Friends of the Pinole Library will host its Spring Book Sale on Saturday, May 14, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Pinole Library.

he Contra Costa County Historical Society (CCCHS) operates a major archival collection documenting the history of the county at its Contra Costa History Center at 724 Escobar Street, in Martinez.

At our May 13 meeting, CCCHS representatives will describe the collection, consisting of letters, diaries, manuscripts of writings, legal records, photographs, maps, newspapers, periodicals, and books.

The History Center is not a museum or a place where yesterday's artifacts sit mute in dusty corners. Rather, it is designed to be primarily a living archive, a treasure trove of the records, the letters, the pictures, maps, and books — the thousand and one records that tell the story of our past.

It is intended as a focus for scholarly activity, offering valuable resources available for serious students and writers of history and a place where teachers can find prime source material on the county's past to share with their students.

The center is the place where all the county's community historical societies can search for additional materials to add to their individual collections. Moreover, it is planned as a workshop where educational programs and interpretive exhibits on various aspects of county history can be put together for loan to schools and businesses. One of the main objectives is to get as many of the society's historical materials out where they can be seen and enjoyed by all of the citizenry.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Francis Hopkinson, of New Jersey, a naval flag designer and a signer of the Declaration of Independence, designed the 1777 flag.

The original flag has been modified 26 times and was unchanged with its 48 stars for 47 years, beginning with Arizona's and New Mexico's admittance to the Union on July 4, 1912. On January 3, 1959, when Alaska was admitted to the Union, the number of stars increased to 49. On August 21, 1959, when Hawaii was admitted to the Union, the flag showed 50 stars.

JUNIOR RANGER DAY AT SAN FRANCISCO MARITIME NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK PROMISES NAUTICAL FUN AND SKILL BUILDING ON APRIL 17

an Francisco
Maritime National
Historical Park will
host a free Junior
Ranger Day event on Sunday, April 17, between 10
AM and 4 PM, geared
toward children ages 5-12
and their families. Normal
admission fees to board the
park's historic ships will be
waived on this day for all
visitors.

Junior Ranger Day is a nationwide event (held at different parks on different dates) that gives young visitors a chance to explore their national parks, learn skills from staff and park rangers, and earn prizes.

At San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park on April 17, rangers will

set up demonstration stations and arts-and-craft tables for "junior rangers" along Hyde Street Pier, in our Maritime Museum, and aboard our historic ships, where kids can learn and practice nautical skills.

Rangers and park volunteers will lead demonstrations and crafts including caulking, knot tying, building toy wooden boats, weaving rope, and making necklaces using the signal flag alphabet.

With the San Francisco Maritime National Park Association's "Age of Sail" staff, young visitors will also learn to work as a team of sailors and lower a boat into the water and then "heave ho!" to bring it back up.

Simultaneously at the Maritime Museum (900 Beach Street), kids can try their hand at scrimshaw and fancywork, follow a scavenger hunt, and draw their own figurehead. Teens from the San Francisco Sea Scout program will also be on hand to teach knot





tying and assist with crafts.

Children who complete all activities will receive a certificate and a prize at the end of the day.

The first 15 kids who arrive at the event will also get a free copy of the sea-faring fantasy adventure novel for young adults, "The

Defiant," by M. Quint, published by McSweeney's Press.

Junior Ranger Day at San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park kicks off National Park Week (April 16-24), a week of free admission days in all national

parks across the country. Additional fee-free days for 2016 will be August 25-28 (Centennial of the National Park Service), September 24 (National Public Lands Day), and November 11 (Veterans Day).

San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park is located at the west end of Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco, at the corner of Hyde and Jefferson.

The park includes a magnificent fleet of historic ships, a Visitor Center, the Maritime Museum (900 Beach Street), Maritime Research Center (open by appointment in Fort Mason Center), and the Aquatic Park Historic District.

National Park Service seeks volunteer docents for Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park


Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park in Richmond seeks dedicated volunteers to join our team in assisting rangers at the Visitor Education Center, orienting visitors to the park, providing informal interpretation of historical resources, and participating in special events.

Prior to starting your volunteer responsibilities, each volunteer must attend two three-hour training sessions on Saturdays April 16 and April 30, from 10 AM – 1 PM. Volunteers at the park must agree to a one year commitment and a minimum of eight hours per month. National Park Volunteer uniform shirts are provided.
