



LARGE GROUP ATTENDS DEDICATION OF SCHOOL BELL

he 100+-year-old Pinole-Hercules School #1 bell, restored and installed at Collins Elementary School by the West Contra Costa Unified School District, was formally dedicated at a brief ceremony January 25.

More than 50 people attended the ceremony, including four members — Charles Ramsey,

Madeline Kronenberg, Todd Groves, and Randy Enos — of the WCCUSD Board of Directors.

Pinole Historical Society co-founder George Vincent, a graduate of the "School on the Hill," spoke about the history of the school and some of the people who went there.

Selma Greenfield Riskin, 85, daughter of Jacob Greenstein, who owned Pinole's only pharmacy in

the 1920s and 1930s, drove from her Alameda home to offer an anecdote about how she used the bell as an alarm clock to get up and get ready for classes when she lived on Samuel Street, just down the hill from the school.

The bell is the last remnant of the school that served generations of Pinole and Hercules students from 1906 to 1966. The school was demolished in 1968.

The district also installed a bronze plaque on the wall behind the bell.

The Richmond Museum of History owns many collections of interest to the casual researcher and the scholar alike.



These include:

- **Photographs:** Prints, negatives, and slides dating from the late 19th century to the present day.
- Maps and brochures: From the late 19th century to the present day.
- Genser-Maack Collection: Lynn and Sandi Genser-Maack have ammassed a unique collection of Richmond memorabilia. A small part of their treasure is on display in the museum, and includes many promotional items given away by Richmond businesses over the years and other items of Richmond nostalgia.



National Park Service/Richmond Museum film festival presents post-war films about World War II home front

he National Park Service (NPS) and the Richmond Museum of History announce a new film festival on the third Thursday of each month.

The movies will be screened as part of the "Third Thursday Historic Film Series" aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored cargo ship built in Richmond during World War II.

The ship, now part of Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park, is located in historic Shipyard #3 at 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. For directions, call (510) 237-2933 or visit www.ssredoakvictory.com/contact.htm.

Boarding begins at 6:30 p.m. and the films begin at 7 p.m. There is a donation of \$5 to board the ship and enjoy ship exhibits prior to the film. Please note: the ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be able to climb the gangplank (40 feet of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard.

Remember to dress warmly, as it can be chilly aboard the ship.

The featured movies are:

- Thursday, February 20: Dear Ruth (1947), starring William Holden and Joan Caulfield. Caulfield discovers her younger sister has been using her name and picture in correspondence with a soldier who comes to visit.
- Thursday, March 20: Away All Boats (1956), starring Jeff Chandler and George Nader tells a quintessential story of WWII in the Pacific from the viewpoints of a career Navy officer and a drafted Merchant Marine officer.
- Thursday, April 17: The Sea Chase (1955), starring John Wayne and Lana Turner. Merchant captain John Wayne tries to evade and escape from enemy ships and take his crew home.
- Thursday, May 15: Swing Shift (1984), starring Goldie Hawn and Kurt Russell. California aircraft workers support the war effort and find romance on the home front.


Immense wealth was created from goods shipped from maritime Contra Costa County, securing a vibrant economy from the Gaslight era to the days of Haight-Ashbury.

In these pages, Carol A. Jensen, a member of the East Contra Costa Historical Society. presents the county's vibrant maritime history. She presents images drawn from the Library of Congress, California State Library, San Francisco Historical Photograph Collection, Contra Costa County archives, and important local historical society collections.

Herein we experience in vintage photographs this region's impact on significant California events. Wines to challenge French viticultural supremacy were shipped, grains destined to make Guinness beer great set sail, and soldiers embarked for the World War II Pacific theater from these piers.

Maritime Contra Costa County provides a fresh perspective on the intertwined histories of San Francisco and its "other coast."




You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.
