
With Major League Spring

built. Burrow didn't play Major League baseball, but he played five seasons as a wide receiver for the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League.

In addition to these baseball players, Pinole has produced several all-star softball players, including Anne Walsh and Stephanie Tamayo, who will also be profiled during this program.

Many PVHS athletes were coached by Mike LeFebvre, who taught math and physical education at PVHS, where he coached softball (15 years), football (10 years), and basketball (10 years).

He coached softball at Contra Costa College for 10 years and baseball for three years at Will C. Wood High School in Vacaville.

Mike's father, Lawrence "Big Red" LeFebvre, founded and managed the Pinole Merchants, one of the Bay Area's best semipro teams, in the late 1930s. He returned to Pinole after serving in World War II and resumed managing the Merchants.

Mike works part-time for the Giants, where "I mostly talk about baseball with the fans," he says. "But I also show you where to get garlic fries, where the bathroom is, and if somebody is in your seat, I'll throw them out for you."

PINOLE VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES DRAFTED BY MAJOR LEAGUE TEAMS

eventeen players from Pinole Valley High School have been drafted by Major League teams, quite a feat for a community of Pinole's size. Also, one Pinole resident, Kenny Burrow, a catcher for De Anza High School before PVHS was built, was drafted. He played pro football instead.


Membership drive

PHS PROGRAMS SET FOR MAY, SEPTEMBER

e have several interesting programs lined up this year. Our focus will be not only on Pinole history, but the history of the region. We have scheduled programs for our May 13 and September 9 meetings. We'll announce our November 4 program as we move closer to that date.

Here are our scheduled programs all from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in conference rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building, 1301 Pinole Valley Road:

May 13: The Contra Costa County Historical Society (CCCHS) operates a major archival collection documenting the history of the county at its Contra Costa History Center at 724 Escobar Street, in Martinez. CCCHS representatives will describe the collection, consisting of letters, diaries, manuscripts of writings, legal records, photographs, maps, newspapers, periodicals, and books.

September 9: Beverly Lane, former mayor of Danville and curator of the Museum of the San Ramon Valley, will speak about the history of the San Ramon Valley, which has many parallels to the history of West Contra Costa County. Beverly is the author of the recently published book, *San Ramon Chrinocles: Stories of Bygone Days*.


