"The title of my talk is 'Lost Cities of the East Bay,' but the focus is the south side of the Carquinez Strait from the Port Costa Brick Works in the east to Point Pinole in the west," Robinson says.

"I use the word 'cities' for brevity; these places were never cities, or even towns. At best they were villages, a collection of ferry and train stops, hotels, stores, company houses, and, mostly, saloons, that sprang up around the factories and plants of the early twentieth century." South Vallejo and was mentioned in a Robert Louis Stevenson story;

- The Selby Smelting Plant;
- Tormey;

• Oleum, a tiny community that sprang up around the Standard Oil Refinery near Rodeo;

- The Hercules Powder Works; and
- The Atlas Powder Works at Giant.

"Most of these places are long gone, or were absorbed into larger communities," Robinson says.

"But, they all are interesting footnotes to our local history."

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MUSEUM UPDATE AND 2018 PROGRAMS

he society has sought to broaden its program offerings to include talks not only on Pinole's history, but also on the history of neighboring communities, and the Bay Area in general.

The response to John Robinson's program, "Finding the Bay Bridge Troll," last September was so well-received that we invited John to return February 2 with an intriguing program, "Finding the Lost Cities of the East Bay." There's a synopsis on the front page of this newsletter. I hope you are able to attend; John is very knowledgeable and a lot of fun to hear.

Returning to local history, George Vincent, our vice-president, society co-founder, and historian, is scheduled to present "What's in a Name?" on Friday, May 4.

This program will explore the people — and inanimate objects — behind Pinole's street names. George grew up with many of these people, so expect some very funny, never-before-heard stories.

Future programs will be announced soon.

MUSEUM UPDATE

There was significant progress in the last quarter of 2017, most significantly the receipt of the Pinole History Museum's 501(c)(3) status from the Internal Revenue Service.

This designation will enable the museum to solicit tax-deductible donations, which will begin soon.

The Pinole History Museum Board of Directors (separate from the society's board of directors) is planning for the restoration of the interior of the Faria House and turning it into "a contemporary museum in a classic home."

The City of Pinole, the museum's partner in this project, has presented markups of the Faria house floor plans to several architectural firms in the Bay Area.

We are waiting for proposals from the architects so we'll know how much the project will cost, how much money the museum will have to raise, and how long it will take before the museum opens.

These are exciting times for the Pinole Historical Society and the Pinole History Museum. I hope you share in our excitement and anticipation.

Pinole has such an interesting history. The society has enjoyed sharing it with you through programs, library exhibits, history walks, interviews with notable citizens, and other events.

We are looking forward to sharing it with you in the Pinole History Museum.

The Pinole Historical Society has a limited number of copies of the new book, *East Bay Hills: A Brief History*, published by Arcadia Publishing.



The book brings to light the workings and people that made the Pinole-Hercules Union School District the envy of surrounding townships.







Flag Holidays

Livery year we see more American flags being displayed for community and special events.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Francis Hopkinson, of New Jersey, a naval flag designer and a signer of the Declaration of Independence, designed the 1777 flag.

The original flag has been modified 26 times and was unchanged with its 48 stars for 47 years, beginning with Arizona's and New Mexico's admittance to the Union on July 4, 1912. On January 3, 1959, when Alaska was admitted to the Union, the number of stars increased to 49. On August 21, 1959, when Hawaii was admitted to the Union, the flag showed 50 stars.

- Mother's Day (Second Sunday in May)
- Peace Officers Memorial Day (May 15; half-staff all day)
- · Armed Forces Day (Third Saturday in May)
- Memorial Day (Last Monday in May; half-staff until noon)
- · D-Day (June 6)
- Flag Day (June 14)
- Father's Day (Third Sunday in June)

- Independence Day (July 4)
- Korean War Veterans Day (July 27)
- V-J Day (September 2)
- · Labor Day (First Monday in September)
- Patriot Day (September 11; half staff all day)
- Constitution Day September 17)
- · Gold Star Mothers Day (September 27)
- Columbus Day (Oct. 12)
- · Navy Day (October 27)
- Election Day (First Tuesday in November)
- · Veterans Day (Nov. 11)
- Thanksgiving Day (Fourth Thursday in November)
- Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day (December 7; half staff all day)
- Christmas Day (Dec. 25)

Other flag holidays include Inauguration Day (every four years), election days, state and local holidays, Admission Day, and others proclaimed by the President of the United States.
