KAISER TO HOST FEBRUARY 16 EVENT


he Pinole Historical Society's February 16 quarterly membership meeting will feature two interesting presentations, including a book signing featuring a well-known local author.


PINOLE . . . THEN AND NOW NEW LIBRARY EXHIBIT

Lawrence Radcliffe, DDS, 2000 Appian Way, Suite 203, donated a copy of *Ignacio Martinez and the Rancho El Pinole 1823-1868*, the master's thesis written by former Pinole Mayor Egdar Vovsi in December of 1970. Vovsi submitted it to the College of Holy Names, Graduate History Division.

Doris McPherson-Salmi, whose late father, John McPherson, was a member of the Pinole Historical Society in the 1970s, and served as secretary, donated a file of her father's papers, notes, and articles.

"My father was not an 'old-time' Pinole person like so many I know from years past," says Doris, who lives in Rodeo. "We moved to Pinole in 1955, but he was very committed to his city and loved every square inch of it!

"When I catch George Vincent on TV with his walking tours I am taken back to a time I remember so fondly. The names are familiar; it brings me such pleasure watching and knowing that someone has taken the time to document this information and has shared it!"

Lyn and Ted Keller, of El Sobrante, donated a 1906 Punett Brothers cloth map of the Bay Area counties, featuring all of the ranchos of that era.

Chris Treadway, of the *West County Times*, donated numerous newspaper articles and photos from the paper's archives, including information about the Pinole Spring Festival, Oktoberfest celebrations, home construction in Pinole Valley, a 1991 oil spill, and events and programs at the Pinole library.

TEACHING AMERICAN HISTORY PROJECT AT HERCULES LIBRARY

he Hercules Library will host a lecture by Dr. Linda Ivey, a specialist in environmental, cultural, ethnic and labor history, as part of the West Contra Costa Unified School District Teaching American History Project on Saturday, January 28, from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. This is a free event.

Professor Ivey is a specialist in environmental, cultural, ethnic and labor history. She is the

coordinator of the Public History program at Cal State University-East Bay, where she also teaches courses in the history of California and the West, as well as in the environment, and immigration.

Professor Ivey is working on a book that explores the links among the changing environment, immigration, and class conflict in California in the early 20th century.

SHADOWS ON THE HILLS

Place Names of Contra Costa County, CA

ave you ever wondered about the origins of your own street name—perhaps those of your neighborhood or town?

Contra Costa is small in area but once played a huge role in settling the West. The Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers along with the wild and dangerous delta made this county the crossroads of California.

The heritage of many peoples and events are echoed in Contra Costa names. As new settlers and adventurers invaded the land of the first Americans, place names also changed. Old place names disappear or become historical "ghosts" recalling people and events that have faded from our popular memories.

Indian wars, Spanish conquistadors, scalp collectors, and grizzly hunters are in this book. Bloody range wars, infamous brothels—even a drunken pig are—remembered as names on dusty maps.


You live where Spanish dons, outlaws, swindlers, mining barons, cattle and wheat kings have risen and fallen. All have become part of the many stories behind our local place names, past and present.

Before the discovery of the oil and gas in the Central Valley, Contra Costa was the energy capital of California. A time remembered today only by the names of its coal kings and scattered ghost towns. This county's silver and copper rush and its redwood logging boom are long past but for those who know our history, their presence still lives on in the names of hills and now silent canyons. After both scoundrels and heroes are gone, only their names remain on the land, fading and fleeting like shadows on the hills.
