EIGHT STUDENTS WIN ESSAY-CONTEST GRAND PRIZES

tudents at Collins, Ellerhorst, Shannon, and St. Joseph schools were awarded certificates of merit for their participation in the fifth annual Pinole Historical Society Essay Contest. Awards were given June 3 and 4.

This year, students were asked to write essays about "What Makes a Community Like Pinole so Special?"

Eight students won grand prizes — a Target gift card and a copy of the book, *Images of America: Pinole*, for their superior essays. The grand-prize winners were:

- Shannon Elementary School: Madisonn Browning (second grade) and Isabelle Tehrani (fifth grade). This was the second time Isabelle won the contest's grand-prize. She also won in 2012.
- Collins Elementary School: Jonathan Tesfa, Andrea Perez, and Justine De La Cruz. All are in the fourth grade.

OLD SCHOOL BELL INSTALLED

The school bell that rang several generations of Pinole and Hercules students to class was installed next to the Collins Elementary School multi-purpose room by a crew of expert West Contra Costa Unified School District maintenance workers on June 26.

The bell is all that remains of the Pinole-Hercules School #1, the "Old School," which was in service from 1906 to 1966. It was demolished in 1968.

The school district is working on a bronze plaque that will be placed at the base of the bell. The Pinole Artisans has been commissioned to paint a mural that will be hung on the wall behind the bell. When all this is done, the PHS will have a formal dedication ceremony.

WELLS FARGO PINOLE MURAL DEDICATION JULY 25

NOTICE WILL BE SENT TO CONFIRM DATE AND TIME

he dedication of the Pinole historical mural in the Pinole office of Wells Fargo Bank at 1374 Fitzgerald Drive, tentatively has been scheduled for Thursday, July 25, at 11 a.m.

Historic images of Pinole's rich history, beginning with the El Rancho Pinole land grant of 1823, are featured in the dramatic mural, part of the bank's Community Mural Program.

A typical mural design combines Wells Fargo images and local images that reflect the history and diversity of the community. An accompanying legend describes each historical image used.

The Pinole mural includes images of a map of the land grant, the Martinez Adobe, downtown Pinole in the 1920s, Lawrence "Big Red" LeFebvre, the Pinole-Hercules School (the Old School), the Pinole Fire Department (and Chief Wallace "Pepper" Martin) in the early 1950s, the 1904 class of the Plaza School (featuring teacher Frances Ellerhorst), the original Santa Fe depot, Hercules Powder Works employees, Bernardo Fernandez, and the seal of the city of Pinole.

Wells Fargo donateed \$500 to the PHS for providing all of the local images for the mural.

he PHS thanks *West County Times* columnist Chris Treadway for donating this wedding photo of Louise Allen Tennent, who married James Hugh Tennent, son of Dr. Samuel J. Tennent. The pohoto dates to around 1880.

Chris found the photo while rummaging through his grandmother's heirlooms. Chris tells us:

"My grandmother knew their daughter, Margaret, growing up in Tulare. I met Margaret Tennent Botts, born in Pinole in 1893, in 1981.

"The photo is from the Louis Stein collection. I don't know if you already have it [we didn't]. Louis Stein and my grandmother both graduated from Cal in 1924."

James Tennent built a two-story home for his bride, Louise, on land across the street from his father's ranch on Pinole Valley Road. That home was later sold to Joseph and Maria Faria, whose children and grandchildren were reared in that house. The Faria House was moved to 2100 San Pablo Avenue in 2005 to make room for the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building.



CELEBRATE OUR INDEPENDENCE ABOARD THE RED OAK VICTORY

ickets are being sold for the annual July 3 BBQ with fireworks aboard the historic SS Red Oak Victory at the Port of Richmond.

Launched on November 9, 1944, as the SS Red Oak Victory, and commissioned as the USS Red Oak Victory (AK235) in December 1944, the Red Oak Victory is the only vessel built by the Kaiser Shipyards in Richmond that is being restored.

The ship saw service in World War II, Korea,

and Vietnam, and has the distinction of being the only ship operated by both military and civilian personnel during her career.

In 1996, by an Act of Congress, title to the SS Red Oak Victory was conveyed to the Richmond Museum Association.

One of the primary goals of the museum is to preserve, restore and develop the Red Oak Victory into a viable asset that can be used, enjoyed and appreciat-

ed by the citizens of Richmond and the surrounding Bay Area communities.

The historic World War II cargo ship is owned and maintained by the Richmond Museum of History. The ship opens to visitors 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday.

The last docent tour of the day begins at 2 p.m.



NATIONAL PARK SERVICE TO COMMEMORATE THE 69TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE PORT CHICAGO EXPLOSION

oin the National Park Service and the Friends of Port Chicago National Memorial to honor the 320 men who lost their lives in the largest WWII military disaster on the home front. Visitors are invited to attend the ceremony at 10 a.m. on Saturday, July 20, 2013 at the site of the catastrophe, which occurred on July 17, 1944, at Port Chicago Naval Magazine in

Concord, when two ships being loaded with ammunition exploded.

Following the ceremony, all visitors are welcome to attend a short ranger-led program and a screening of "...into forgetfulness," a documentary film about Port Chicago. Visitors will have an opportunity to share stories and learn more about the explosion, the desegregation of the United States Armed Forces, and the birth of the civil rights movement in our country.

As the event will be held on an active military base, all visitors must have reservations and a security check. Visitors age 18 and under must be accompanied by an adult, but do not need to provide the infor-




mation below. When reserving a spot, please be ready to give the following:

- The identification number of a government issued ID, e.g,. driver's license, state issued ID.




You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.





Two documentaries being shown at Rosie the Riveter/ WWII Home Front National Historical Park

new documentary film called "The War At Home" is being shown daily at the Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park. The 25-minute film screens hourly at the park's Visitor Education Center, starting at 11 a.m.. The last screening is at 4 p.m. It's shown seven days a week.

"The War At Home," produced in collaboration between the National Park Service and Signature



Communications, uses oral histories, archival materials, and personal diaries to illustrate the diversity and complexity of the World War II homefront experience, from the perspective of a number of real people who lived in different cities across the United States.

Another 16-minute documentary film, "Home Front Heroes," which outlines the history of defense manufacturing in Richmond, during World War II, is also screened regularly, alternating with "The War At Home."

5TH ANNUAL HOME FRONT FILM FESTIVAL PRESENTS 6 WWII-ERA FILMS ABOARD THE SS RED OAK VICTORY

he Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical Park and the Richmond Museum of

History Association will present the 5th Annual WWII Home Front Film Festival on Thursdays in July and August. The film festival will feature popular, full-length movies that were shown on the Home Front during the WWII period.

Six movies will be screened aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored ship built in Richmond during World War II. The ship is located in historic Shipyard #3, where thousands of Americans labored to build 747 ships over the course of the war. Ship address: 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. Boarding is at 6:30 pm and the films begin at 7. There is a donation of \$5 to board the ship and enjoy ship exhibits prior to the film. Please note: the ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be

able to climb gangplank (40 feet, of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard ship.

The movies include:

July 11: Casablanca (1942). Starring Humphrey Bogart and Ingrid Bergman: This "viewer's choice" film is being reprised this year, as it was chosen by the festi-

val audience as a favorite from the last four years. Casablanca is considered the greatest romance film of all time.

July 25: Lifeboat (1944). Written by John Steinbeck and directed by Alfred Hitchcock: This film was also a top audience choice, full of twists and turns only Hitchcock can deliver.

August 8: The Story of G.I. Joe (1945). Starring Burgess Meredith and Robert Mitchum. As WWII came to an end, this film was a realistic look at what it was like to serve as a solider in the European Theater. It's based on the life of the famed war correspondent Ernie Pyle.

August 22: Dear Ruth (1946). starring William Holden and Joan Caulfield. Based on the 1944 play, a borrowed identity has hilarious consequences.

Popcorn and refreshments will

be available for purchase. A National Park Service ranger will provide an introduction to the films in the context of the WWII Home Front.
