

HELP US IDENTIFY THE ORIGIN OF THESE TOKENS: The trading tokens above, dating to the 1920s, were made of aluminum and about the size of a nickel. When money was scarce during the Great Depression, many grocery stores and other businesses issued their own trade tokens to stimulate their business and the local economy. The Pinole Historical Society is looking for information about these tokens. Research indicates the name "airdome" was frequently applied to drive-in movie theatres, though Pinole did not have a drive-in theatre. A 1916 publication called "Moving Picture World" said "The Star Theater [in Pinole] being erected by David Herracher is rapidly nearing completion." PHS SEEKING FAMILY FILMS FOR HISTORICAL ARCHIVE

ot film? The Pinole Historical Society is embarking on a major project to archive the city's history.

We want to establish a permanent, digitized collection of Pinole's history.

Do you have film of past Holy Ghost parades, Pinole Valley High School Homecoming parades, Memorial Day or July 4 parades?

How about important athletic events, such as a high-school football, basketball, baseball, softball, or volleyball games?

Perhaps you have film of an important event that took place in Fernandez Park, or a ribbon cutting or an event that has a place in Pinole's history — such as the 1958 flood?

We're looking for any video or film you have — VHS, Beta, camcorder, DV tape, 8mm, Super 8mm, 16mm, 35mm, motion picture.



Nearly everyone has taken home movies. That makes everyone who has taken film a historian.

We want to collect, digitize, catalog, and preserve old movies on DVD (and whatever formats are to come) to exhibit, educate, and entertain.

The PHS will share these videos on a film archive that we will establish, similar to the The Pioneers Film Archive on YouTube created by the

California Pioneers of Santa Clara (*www.youtube.com/sccpioneers*).

Film connects with the past in a unique way. It's immersive, educational, and entertaining. It's a way to get young people interested in history.

Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park

7th annual Home Front Film Festival summer schedule

he National Park Service and the Richmond Museum Association will present its 7th Annual Home Front Film Festival on Thursday evenings in June, July ,and August. The film festival will feature six popular, full-length movies that were shown on the American Home Front during WWII.

The film screenings will be presented aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored cargo ship built in Richmond during World War II. The ship is owned and operated by the Richmond Museum Association and is also part of Rosie the Riveter/ WWII Home Front National Historical Park.

The SS Red Oak Victory is located in historic Shipyard #3 at 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. For directions to the shipyard, visit the Red Oak Victory at *www.ssredoak victory.com/ contact.htm*.

Admission is free, but there is a suggested donation of \$10 to help preserve and maintain the ship. Boarding begins at 6:30 p.m. and the films begins at 7 p.m. Popcorn and refreshments will be available for purchase aboard the ship during each screening.

Please note: The ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be able to climb the gangplank (40 feet of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard.

Remember to wear warm clothing, as it can be chilly aboard the ship! Inclement weather may force the ship staff to cancel this program for safety reasons. If it rains, please call the ship at (510) 237-2933 by 5:30 p.m. on the day of the screening to find out if the show will go on.

• June 11: *The Fighting 69th* (1940) with James Cagney. In 1940, as the United States prepared for the war that seemed inevitable, filmmakers looked for ways to prepare a reluctant population. The Fighting 69th is based upon the actual exploits of New York City's 69th Infantry Regiment during

World War I, and centers on misfit Jerry Plunkett (James Cagney), who displays a mixture of bravado, cowardice, and eventually service to the greater good.

• June 25: Invisible Agent (1942), with Peter Lorre. The film was a wartime propaganda production that was part of a Hollywood effort to boost morale on the Home Front. The screenplay was written by Curt Siodmak, a refugee from Nazi Germany.


• July 9: Casablanca (1942), with Humphry Bogart and Ingrid Bergman. Casablanca became the most popular film of the Home Front era and its popularity continues today. Join us for the film and fun, as we recreate Rick's Café Américain aboard the ship. Feel free to dress as your favorite Casablanca character.

• July 23: Northern Pursuit (1943), with Errol Flynn. Royal Canadian Mounted Police Corporal Steve Wagner (Errol Flynn) tries to uncover a Nazi plot against the Allied war effort. The film was set in Canada during the early years of WWII.

• August 13: For Whom the Bell Tolls (1943), with Gary Cooper and Ingrid Bergman. This film is about an American fighting in the Spanish Civil War on the side of the Republicans, who finds romance during a desperate mission to blow up a strategically important bridge.

• August 27: *Dragon Seed* (1944), with Katherine Hepburn. The film portrays a peaceful village in China that has been invaded by the Imperial Japanese Army during the Second Sino-Japanese war. The men in the village choose to adopt a peaceful attitude toward their conquerors, but Jade (Katherine Hepburn), a headstrong woman, stands up to the Japanese. This film is not without controversy, as almost the entire cast of Asian characters is played by Western actors. Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park


LOCAL HISTORY BOOKS AVAILABLE FROM THE PINOLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.







