CONTRA COSTA HISTORICAL SOCIETY WILL PRESENT AT OUR MAY 13 MEETING AT KAISER

The Contra Costa County Historical Society (CCCHS) operates a major archival collection documenting the history of the county at its Contra Costa History Center at 724 Escobar Street, in Martinez.

At our May 13 meeting, CCCHS representatives will describe the collection, consisting of letters, diaries, manuscripts of writings, legal records, photographs, maps, newspapers, periodicals, and books.

The History Center is not a museum or a place where yester-day's artifacts sit mute in dusty corners. Rather, it is designed to be primarily a living archive, a treasure trove of the records, the letters, the pictures, maps, and books — the thousand and one

records that tell the story of our past.

It is intended as a focus for scholarly activity, offering valuable resources available for serious students and writers of history and a place where teachers can find prime source material on the county's past to share with their students. The center is the place where all the county's community historical societies can search for additional materials to add to their individual collections.

Moreover, it is planned as a workshop where educational programs and interpretive exhibits on various aspects of county history can be put together for loan to schools and businesses. One of the main objectives is to get as many of the society's historical materials

out where they can be seen and enjoyed by all of the citizenry.

May 14 Spring book sale


The Friends of the Pinole Library will host its Spring Book Sale on Saturday, May 14, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Pinole Library.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Francis Hopkinson, of New Jersey, a naval flag designer and a signer of the Declaration of Independence, designed the 1777 flag.

The original flag has been modified 26 times and was unchanged with its 48 stars for 47 years, beginning with Arizona's and New Mexico's admittance to the Union on July 4, 1912. On January 3, 1959, when Alaska was admitted to the Union, the number of stars increased to 49. On August 21, 1959, when Hawaii was admitted to the Union, the flag showed 50 stars.

Other flag holidays include Inauguration Day (every four years), election days, state and local holidays, Admission Day, and others proclaimed by the President of the United States.



SAN FRANCISCO MARITIME NATIONAL PARK CELEBRATES ASIAN-PACIFIC AMERICAN HERITAGE MONTH IN MAY

Admission to historic ships: Adults \$10, Ages 15 and under free (with adult supervision), free with National Park passes and for active military with current I.D. Admission to Hyde Street Pier, Visitor Center, and Maritime Museum: free.

The Sea of Invisible Riches: Asian Americans and the Alaska Salmon Grounds, 1880-1929

Sundays, May 22 and 29, 1:00-2:30pm, aboard Balclutha, Hyde Street Pier.

Join us for an exploration of the role Asian Americans played in the struggle for immigration rights in the decades bordering 1900.

This struggle took place on the vast Arctic coast and ocean of Alaska and the Northeast Pacific.

Along the way, learn how Asian Americans captured the invisible riches of a sea whose ecology and environment Europeans were still in the process of understanding.

This program is dialogic in nature and visitors are invited to join in a discussion about themes arising from the tour. Share

your experiences, thoughts and family histories with park staff and fellow visitors (maximum of 20 participants).

Hostile Territory on Land and Sea: Asian Cannery Workers in the Alaska Packers Association

Sundays, May 1 and 15, 2:15-3:00pm, aboard Balclutha, Hyde Street Pier.

This tour explores the role of the ship Star of Alaska (Balclutha) and its role in transporting Asian cannery workers to Alaska for the Alaska Packers Association in the canned salmon trade. From the basic task of signing on for the job to getting back home at the end of the season, extremely poor treatment, struggles, and pitfalls were constant companions for these workers.

Cannery Life: Tour and Discussion

Saturdays, May 21 and 28, 1:00-2:30pm, aboard Balclutha, Hyde Street Pier.

Join us aboard the Balclutha and learn about the working experiences of Asian American cannery workers in the late 1800s. Spend extended time aboard Balclutha and join in a discussion about themes arising from the tour. Share your thoughts and personal experiences with park staff and fellow visitors (maximum of 20 participants).

ONGOING EXHIBITS

The park has a variety of ongoing exhibits that focus on the Asian American experience. Look for the Grace Quan at the small boat dock on Hyde Street

Pier, an example of a small craft that Chinese immigrants used to catch shrimp in San Francisco Bay. Aboard the square-rigger Balclutha, the "Chinatown" exhibit provides an immersive experience into the living quarters of those who sailed to the Alaskan canneries. At the park Visitor Center, exhibits bring to life stories of 19th

century Chinese immigration.

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San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park is located at the west end of Fisherman's Wharf in San Francisco. The second is the Large Activity Room (Room 109), which sits approximately 40 people maximum. Lastly we offer the Small Activity Room (Room 112), which sits approximately 25 people maximum. All rooms have WiFi capabilities. Fax and copy services may be available upon request (additional fees apply).

Application approval is dependent upon availability. Reservations can be made for weekdays, and Saturdays upon special approval. There are no Sunday rentals. Please feel free to contact the Pinole Senior Center Coordinator to see if your desired date and time is available.
