Wells Fargo Bank mural installed, open to public

Parago Bank's mural devoted to Pinole's history was unveiled July 25 at a reception that featured descendants of prominent Pinole residents in the mural in a video, talking about their families and their contributions to the city's history.

Mike and Michele LeFebvre, son and daughter of Lawrence "Big Red" LeFebvre, manager of the Pinole Merchants baseball team, and Susan Fernandez, greatgranddaughter of

Bernardo Fernandez, one of the founders of Pinole, were featured in the video produced by the bank's communications department. All three attended the event.

Historic images of Pinole's rich history, beginning with a map of the El Rancho Pinole land grant of

1823, are featured in this dramatic mural installed on the back wall of the bank at 1374 Fitzgerald Drive.

The mural includes images of the Martinez Adobe, downtown Pinole in the 1930s, Lawrence "Big Red" LeFebvre, the Pinole-Hercules School (the Old School), the Pinole Fire Department in the early 1950s (featuring Fire Chief Wallace "Pepper" Martin), the 1904 class of the Plaza School (featuring teacher Frances Ellerhorst), the

original Santa Fe depot, Hercules Powder Works employees, Bernardo Fernandez, and the seal of the City of Pinole.

The Pinole mural is among nearly 2,000 in Wells Fargo Bank branches nationwide that were created by the bank's Community Mural Program.

President's Message

SPOTLIGHTING PROMINENT PINOLEANS

ver the past five years, we have brought to your attention in this newsletter many stories about the early founding fathers of Pinole. These include the Martinez, Tennent, Fernandez, Collins, and Faria families, and many others spanning 110 years from the El Rancho Pinole land grant up to World War II.

Growth in Pinole was relatively slow during that time period. Pinole was mainly a farming and ranch community with a small-town ambiance of old-fashioned homes and storefront business, including bars, general stores, barbershops, an opera house, livery

stable, and other small stores.

There were several primary schools, and most high-school students were bused to Richmond High School.

The main industry was the Hercules Powder Company, and farming.

Highway 40 (San Pablo Avenue today) kept Pinole in the transportation link from Richmond to Rodeo, Crockett, Port Chicago, and Martinez. The Santa Fe and Southern Pacific (now Union Pacific) railroads provided transportation to other cities, and the Point Richmond ferry provided service to San Francisco.

The great depression in the 1930s hit everyone everywhere hard. Tough times, but Pinole survived.

The end of World War II was a turning point in the birth of a new Pinole that escalated into a huge growth spurt that spread into the '50s and '60s. New homes were built, and new families required more businesses and new schools.

Many of the heads of households were ex-GIs who had spent six years in hell in that war, and Pinole was a perfect peaceful setting to raise family and to live.

Information about the following families comes from articles written for the Pinole-Hercules

In 1943, the Hugh Young family moved to Pinole from Walnut Creek to a residence on Fernandez Avenue, and moved to their new home on 884 Pine Street with a yellow door in 1950. Mr. Young was a special reserve officer in Walnut Creek, and applied for a

position of patrol officer and deputy constable in 1943.

Officer Young was made the new Chief of Police and Constable, replacing Chief Gene Shea, who retired in 1950. Chief Young and his patrolmen boast that there haven't been any fatalities in three years as they strive to slow the speeders as they go through downtown.

Mrs. Young is employed at the Berkeley Northrup King Seed Company. The four Young children are youngest Dale, who lives at home, a student at the Golden Gate Academy in Oakland, to study industrial arts and later a teacher in the same subject. Older ones are Bill Young and family of Vallejo; Betty Howell Young and family of Richmond; and Bob Young of Redwood

Chief Young appears always to be formidable and unapproachable in his patrol car, but he is

quite humorous, friendly, and intelligent. The Young family is a closeknit family sharing vacations and quality family time.

Mr. and Mrs. Wallace R. Martin and family have lived at their new home at 2324 Orleans *Drive for three years.*

Mr. Martin has had the nickname of "Pepper" since childhood. when he was the mascot for a local ball team. Pepper Martin is a native Pinolean, born and raised here.

He joined the Navy in 1943 and was discharged in 1945. Since discharge he has been an employee of Union Oil Company for 13 years. He has been the Pinole Fire Chief for 2 1/2 years and oversees a fire department of 30 voluntary firemen.

able to get a better class rating in order to help reduce the cost of insurance for homeowners.

Chief Martin oversees the volunteer firemen's training, which is done in their spare time six times a month outside their normal jobs. All firemen are required to take two courses every year at Contra Costa Junior College.

The fire department also has received a new piece of equipment, a rescue truck, and new rescue equipment available for trained men to use when needed.

The Martins enjoy fishing, camping, and Lake Tahoe vacations.

I am sure many of you remember these families. Life sixty years ago was much more simple than it is today. In those years, families in neighborhoods were more open, more trusting. We're looking for any video or film you have—VHS, Beta, camcorder, DV tape, 8mm, Super 8mm, 16mm, 35mm, motion picture.


Nearly everyone has taken home movies. That makes everyone who has taken film a historian.



Back in the day

THE PEOPLE VS. JOSE MARIA, AN INDIAN

An 1856 Incident in Pinole

y the 1830s, the California Indians were on the offensive against the ranchos and pueblos (towns) established by the Spanish-speaking Californios.

Many of the once docile and friendly peoples had turned on their conquerors and were now a serious threat to the new order in California under Mexican rule. An atmosphere of fear existed in the coastal settlements and ranchos of Mexican California.

So serious was the danger of hostile Indian attacks that the rancho owners only ventured once a year to round up and brand their cattle in the Contra Costa region from 1832-1836.

Fernando Pacheco, in an 1861 land deposition, recalled that the ranchers and their families lived elsewhere because the "Indians did a great deal of injury, stole horses, burnt homes and murdered families."

Ygnacio Martinez, of the 18,000-acre El Rancho Pinole, did not bring his family from the safety of San Jose to his Pinole Valley adobe home until 1837. By 1838, he had a brass cannon mounted outside his adobe casa because of Indian threats. By 1840, Martinez was cited for leading soldiers to suppress an Indian uprising near Mt. Diablo.

Between 1834 and 1836, Indians raided the town of San Jose and killed ranchers near Monterey. Near San Diego there were kidnappings of members of ranch families.

Why did the Indians turn on the Californios but fail in driving them

The Spanish and Mexican Californios viewed the Indians in California as a resource to be exploited at their whim. Without the protection of the priests in the missions, the Indians were subjected to mistreatment, and worse. It was common practice to raid Indian villages for work slaves and to commit degradations against women and children. Work gangs of Indians were moved from ranch to ranch to build adobe homes, fencing, and land clearing. As late as the 1850s, a work camp of Indians was at the Pinole Adobe Ranch.

The Indians had no protection except to run or fight back. The sudden influx of hordes of Americans and foreigners seeking gold in 1848 and 1849 overwhelmed and stopped the Indian rebellion and sealed their fate. Miners and Yankee Amer-

icans had an even more hateful attitude toward Indians. They committed even more atrocities, killing them with impunity to exterminate them.

So it was that in 1850. a chapter of this sad drama was played out around Pinole, as recounted by Contra Costa Times correspondent Nilda Rego in our winter 2013 newsletter.

Ramon Berryessa kidnapped two adult and two young Indian boys from their village near Clear Lake. The Berryessas, of the Napa area, were known for abducting Indians for forced labor. This time, however, Berryessa had been careless, and was killed with his own sword by the older Indians. The Indians were tracked down and all brought to the new town of Martinez for trial.

Dr. Samuel Tennent, of Pinole, sympathized with the 11-year-old boys' plight and talked the

judge into taking the boys home to his new Pinole ranch and new wife, Rafaela Martinez Tennent. Rafaela already had two Indian servant girls, Luisa and Delphina. Rafaela had the boys baptized and given the Christian names of Diego and Jose Maria.

Jose Maria had been the son of a Clear Lake chief. The two boys did not wish to return home, and a judge gave the Tennents custody of the children. However, the Tennents' kindness was soon to be tested.

By 1856, Jose Maria, then 17, was charged with committing a crime against a white settler, Michael Scanlan. Jose Maria was charged with using force and arms and unlawfully making an assault with a "riata" (Mexican lariat) on

Scanlan. He apparently roped Scanlan, "beat, bruised and ill-treated him with intent to kill," the charges claimed.

No reason was given for the attack, but evicting unwanted squatters from Tennent properties was a common occurrence in the 1850s. Tennent himself had to use firearms to protect his lands. Jose Maria was jailed and a trial held. The outcome was predictable, being an Anglo vs. an Indian. Jose Maria was found quilty, costing Tennent \$500 in gold coins.

Michael Scanlan would settle in Pinole Valley in 1870. He and his wife, Penelope, would purchase more than 300

acres for \$7,000 from Patrick and John Tormey. Here they would raise their 10 children. One son, Michael Scanlan, would become Pinole's tough Irish constable from the 1890s to 1910.

The Scanlan Ranch would be sold in 1911 to William Mohring. It would become Pinole's oldest working ranch, and is still run by Mohring descendants.

What became of Jose Maria is lost in Tennent family history.

Richmond Home Front Festival will feature kids' activities

he 7th Annual Home Front Festival on Saturday, October 12, will feature interactive activities for family members of all ages.

Piggy-backing on Rosie the Riveters' motto, "We Can Do It," the festival will present "Kids Can Do It," and focus on engaging youth in their Richmond history.

The event will be held



from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Craneway Pavilion, located in the historic Ford Point Building.

The event will again

sponsor the Historic Duck, an amphibious vehicle from the WWII era, to take families on water tours, with an oral history of the nearby shipyards of Richmond, other historic landmarks. Historic WWII buses will shuttle festival-goers from the main festival site to the SS Red Oak Victory Ship.

The festival includes the YMCA's Rosie the Riveter Family Run/Walk.

PINOLE AND HERCULES WORKERS WENT ON STRIKE IN 1907

n 1907, the California Powder Works factory was owned by corporate giant DuPont, which opposed union demands for an eight-hour workday.

Hercules was a small company town then, and much of the 1,000-member workforce lived in Pinole. In this chapter of the struggle between labor unions and corporations, the company conceded to union demands.




















50 years ago — 1963
