ALL ABOARD THE POTOMAC

he history of the USS Potomac, from its service as the "Floating White House" of President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, to its rescue from scrapping and restoration, will be the topic of the Pinole Historical Society's February 10 meeting.

As always, members and guests are welcome to attend from 6:30 to 8 p.m. in Conference Rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser Permanente Medical Office Building, 1301 Pinole Valley Road.

Bill Hodges, a docent for 19 years with the Potomac Association, which rescued the ship from the scrap heap and restored it, will present a 14-minute video outlining the ship and the part it played in FDR's administrations. The ship is docked at Jack London Square in Oakland and is open for public tours.

After the video, he'll tell FDR stories, including some about those people who surrounded our 32nd president, answer questions from the audience, and conduct a fun quiz afterward, with awarding of passes for dockside tours.

The program also highlights the Potomac Association's educational program and how tens-of-thousands of Northern California children have benefited from it.

The Potomac was originally commissioned the USCG Cutter Electra in 1934. In 1936, it was renamed the USS Potomac and served as FDR's presidential yacht until his death in 1945. More than a quarter of a million people have visited and sailed aboard the USS Potomac since it opened to the public in the summer of 1995.

EXCITING TIMES FOR HISTORIANS

ne of the exciting things about history is it's always happening. Many people think history is about old stuff, but history is happening all around us, every day.

A new U.S. president has been inaugurated. I'm certain that whatever Donald Trump does over the next four years, it will be historic, affect future history, and will be recorded for generations to study and debate.

Locally, there is much history happening, as well. We have a new mayor, Debbie Long, a new shopping center at Gateway West, and a new history book about the early schools of Pinole,

"School Bells and Ink Wells," written by Pinole's historian and the Pinole Historical Society's cofounder, George Vincent.

If you went to elementary school in Pinole, George's book is one you'll want in your library. It's a gem.

He's an extraordinary storyteller and documentarian of this city's history. There are around 100 years of Pinole's school history shared between George and his mother, Emily Scanlan Vincent, both career educators.

George spent a decade researching Pinole's early schools — Fitzgerald Ranch School, Pinole Plaza School, and Pinole-Hercules School #1.

His 124-page book, filled with stories, anecdotes, and photos, brings to light the workings and people that made the Pinole-Hercules Union School District the envy of other townships.

PINOLE HISTORY MUSEUM

In September 2016, the Pinole City Council voted to establish a museum in the Faria House, and entrusted the Pinole Historical Society to plan the design of the museum and find an architect.

In October, we invited the community to participate in a "design-a-museum" program, and we got

lots of good ideas about what people want to see in this museum.

We have met with one architect and are scheduling a meeting with another. We are also getting advice from other museum professionals.

Establishing a museum is the society's main focus now. We want it to be a museum that people of all ages will want to visit repeatedly.

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PINOLE THEN AND NOW

n 1961, some cars had fins and the west side of Tennent Avenue between San Pablo Avenue and Pear Street was fully occupied, with the Pinole Shopping Center/Pinole Food Center grocery store and meat market, the post office (before it moved to a new building on Pear Street),

Valentine's Cleaners, and the Town Tavern.

These buildings are gone today, and all the land is vacant, save for the Pump House gas station and convenience store on the southwest corner of San Pablo and Tennent.





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
School Bells and Ink Wells

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GEORGE VINCENT'S BOOK ABOUT THE EARLY SCHOOLS OF PINOLE HAS ARRIVED

inole Historical Society co-founder and historian George Vincent's long-awaited book, "School Bells and Ink Wells: a History of the Early Schools of Pinole, 1865-1968," has been published and is for sale.

The 124-page book, featuring more than 150 photos, some never-before seen, chronicles the history of the Fitzgerald Ranch School (1865-1886), Plaza School (1886-1906), and Pinole-Hercules School #1 (1906-1966).

The book is filled with stories and amusing anecdotes, and anyone who went to school in Pinole will treasure this fond memory of their early education. It brings to light the workings and people that made the Pinole-Hercules Union School District the envy of surrounding townships.

Hill School alumni are fiercely loyal to their "green school" that stood atop Samuel Street in Pinole until 1968. There is a shared pride of camaraderie understood only by those who bore the trials of the daily

uphill climb to the creaking stairs and dark halls haunted by the strict stares of lurking teachers.

A CASTLE IN PINOLE?

ince my child-hood, I have always been fascinated by the building located at 2131 San Pablo Avenue in Pinole. It was directly across the street from the house I first lived in when I married in 1947.

I knew it as the Pythian Castle, which always seemed to have some sort of mystery associated with its name. Who would ever have dreamed of having a castle in the little town of Pinole?

It is a rather unique structure in the 2100 block of San Pablo Avenue, aside from the Curran family home a few doors down (formerly the Garden of Gems) and the relocated Faria farmhouse across the street.

It is a white with blue trim wood-framed building with a gabled roof and some stained glass windows, one of which survived a gas-line explosion next door on February 17, 1998. It suffered blown-out windows and other minor damage, but

the building next door that housed the Second Fiddle thrift store,was completely leveled.

I have known it as the Pythian Castle since I went there during the 1930s for variety programs that were put on by our local churches or fraternal organizations who shared their auditorium.

Fraternal organizations such as Masons, Odd Fellows, Redmen, Elks, Eagles, Woodmen, Knights of Columbus, and Knights of Pythias, were very popular in those days.

The Knights of Pythias has a very long and colorful history. It became a secret fraternal organization in Washington, D.C., on February 19, 1864, founded by Justus Rathbone. Its name came from a play, "Damon and Pythias," written by Irish poet John Banim. Its legend illustrates the ideals of loyalty, honor, and friendship that are the center of the order.

When a man was inducted as a member, he received a ceremonial sword, presented as a

token of esteem by family members or business associates. A local chapter was known as a "castle." I was a bit disappointed to find that there was no fairytale connection to my Pythian Castle.

Pinole's First Methodist Episcopal Church built this wooden structure in 1898 at 2131 San Pablo Avenue. When the church built its second home on Valley Avenue in 1924, the building was sold to the Order of the Knights of Pythias


Local Methodist church records show that the first Protestant services in Pinole were held from 1889 until April 24, 1898, at the site of the Plaza School, where today's post office stands.


Ministers from Presbyterian, Methodist, and

Continued from page 6 Baptist churches in Richmond took turns preaching on Sunday evenings.

There was also a Martinez-Pinole connection when, from 1890 until the new church building was dedicated in 1898, Methodist ministers came to preach on Sunday evenings.

Little is recorded about the building once it became the Pythian Castle.

It was an Assembly of God church later on and was occupied by Elaine Pond's Insurance agency for a couple of years. The Scolari & Sons Tile Company ran its business out of that building.

The present owner, Dennis Lorette, CPA, purchased the building in 1984. He shares his office there with several other businesses.

I am very grateful to Dennis for providing me with information he had on the early history of the building.

He loves the architecture and history related to the building, and would be proud to show you around if you appreciate the building as much as he does.

A PINOLE LANDMARK COMES TO LIGHT

ne of the joys of researching the past is discovering history that has been lost or misplaced in time.

Such is the case of Pinole's first and only large-scale department store, built by Abraham Greenfield in 1905 on the southwest corner of Tennent Avenue and Pear Street.

No early pictures of the building by itself were ever found. It only appeared in group photos of nearby buildings showing vague portions of the structure in later years and after different remodeling phases. Thanks to a discovery by PHS member Stephen

Lawton in the Contra **Costa County Historical** Society's archives, we now have an original photo of the pride of Abraham Greenfield's business enterprise in Pinole.


Abraham Greenfield came to Pinole in the late 19th century. In July 1897, he had a smaller store called the "Pinole Bazaar" along Tennent Avenue, between the old Pinole Food Center of the 1960s and today's Pump House convenience store. Here, Greenfield carried almost everything, from furniture and clothing to foodstuffs, paint, liquor, and farming gear.

In 1905, he built the

massive three-story structure with its large staircase just one block from his first store. Greenfield was a respected merchant and member of the Pinole community heavily involved in town politics and social life. He was also a money lender to those needing a loan. His decorated float led Fourth of July parades.

The cover of the Pinole Historical Society's 2009 book, "Images of America, Pinole," shows Greenfield and his patriotic float.

Mr. and Mrs. Greenfield and daughter, Rosalie, carried on the business until moving to San Francisco in the late 1930s. His customers

looked forward to getting calendars and fancy china plates at year's end.

Abraham Greenfield's stellar reputation played a part in freeing the only woman ever put into Pinole's first wooden jail on Pear Street.

In 1900, Constable Michael Scanlan arrested the manager of a boarding house on grand larceny charges. There had been a theft of guns and money from one of her

boarders. Scanlan physically arrested her on Main Street in front of her daughter and many astonished citizens. He shut her in the old jail for hours, as night fell and crowds gathered.

Greenfield was one of the cool-headed onlookers who convinced Scanlan to free the hysterical woman into her husband's custody for the night.

Greenfield's large new building, as seen in the photo, was called the "Big Department Store."

And big it was, selling shoes, clothes, dresses, hardware, wine and spirits, groceries, coal, kerosene, notions, tobacco, candies, and much more. Employees remembered how cold it was inside, as there was no heat in the huge store.

Customers were billed

at month's end and farmers paid bills once a year.

Deliveries were made by spring wagon and a team of horses with an umbrella above the driver's seat.

Twice a week, deliver-

ies were made to the nearby town of Giant. Abraham Greenfield's store in early Pinole was as awesome to Pinoleans Continued on page 10

Continued from page 9 as the new Sprouts Farmers Market is today.

Greenfield's three stories had a staircase and landing at each level, filled with goods.

Outside, the building was attractive, with an imposing cupola and skylight and Italianate-style fence atop the roof.

After the Greenfields left, the building saw a succession of owners. The top floor was removed and apartment units constructed. Bob Dutra and former Pinole fire chief Alex Clark bought the building in 1962 and remodeled it. One popular restaurant still a Pinole fixture on the ground floor is The Alley Cafe, with its

famous 1964 mural of Pinole. Dutra and Clark sold the café, reacquired it, and then sold it again.

Dave Brandt bought it in 1978 after the previous owner died. Cori Brandt worked for her father in the restaurant as a waitress; Dave was the cook. When Dave died in 1992, Cori (Brandt) Clark, by this time married to Alex Clark's son, Chano, took over. Chano and Cori owned the building and the restaurant until selling both in 2015.

Abraham Greenfield had an eye for a great

business location in downtown Pinole. We now know what it looked like to Pinoleans of the past.

Hopefully, we will one day also find missing pictures of the Pinole Opera House, Pinole's social center from 1909 to its fiery end in 1931.

December 27, 1929 – December 26, 2016 Age 86

She was a member St. Joseph's Church, Y.L.I., and the Pinole Chapter of Pocahontas Lodge.

Verla was the wife of the late Bertram Gillikin, and the mother of Kerri Kierstead, Kathy Knoblauch, and Kevin Gillikin. She is also survived by her brother, George Vincent, six grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren, and her faithful dog, Phil.

Verla's familiar face will be missed on the streets of the small town she grew up in and loved. She was happy living in Pinole and making so many lifetime friends. Hers was a good life well spent in doing charity for others and always with a smile.

Former Pinole mayor and lifetime Pinole Historical Society member Virginia Fujita died December 12. She was 69.

Virginia worked for the city of Pinole for many years, and in 2008 ran for the city council. She won, and served three years, from 2008 to 2010, including more than one year as mayor.
