## FIND THE LOST CITIES OF THE EAST BAY ON FEBRUARY 2

uthor John Robinson will explore the history of the long-lost cities of Tormey, Selby, Oleum, Valona, Eckley, Port Costa, and Vallejo Junction, among others, in his February 2,

2018, program, "The Lost Cities of the East Bay."

"The title of my talk is 'Lost Cities of the East Bay', but the focus is the south side of the Carguinez Strait from the Port Costa Brick Works in the east to Point Pinole in the west," Robinson says.

"I use the word 'cities' for brevity; these places were never cities, or even towns. At best they were villages, a collection of ferry and train stops, hotels, stores, company houses, and, mostly, saloons, that sprang up around the factories and plants of the early twentieth century."

Robinson's talk will include photos and comments about:

- The Port Costa Brick Works;
- Waterfront Port Costa during the age of the



• Eckley as a brick works, a fishing resort, and now a regional park;

· Vallejo Junction, a ferry terminal west of Crockett that brought people to South Vallejo and was mentioned in a Robert Louis Stevenson story:

• The Selby Smelting Plant:

Tormey;

• Oleum, a tiny community that sprang up around the Standard Oil Refinery near Rodeo:

• The Hercules Powder Works: and

• The Atlas Powder Works at Giant.


"Most of these places are long gone, or were absorbed into larger communities," Robinson says.

"But, they all are interesting footnotes to our local history."

## MUSEUM UPDATE AND 2018 PROGRAMS

n the last issue of *Newsbriefs* I talked about the society's goal of broadening its program offerings to include talks not only on Pinole's history, but also on the history of neighboring communities, and the Bay Area in general.

The response to our John Robinson's program, "Finding the Bay Bridge Troll," last September was so well-received that we invited John to return with an intriguing program, "Finding the Lost Cities of the East Bay." There's a synopsis on the front page of this newsletter.

John will speak to our members and guests on Friday, February 2. I hope you are able to attend; John is very knowledgeable and a lot of fun to hear.

Returning to local history, George Vincent, our vice-president, society co-founder, and historian, is scheduled to present "What's in a Name?" on Friday, May 4.

This program will explore the people – and inanimate objects – behind Pinole's street names. George grew up with many of these people, so expect some very funny, never-before-heard stories.

We are also planning programs by:

• **Tom Barnidge**, the retired Contra Costa Times columnist;

• John Keibel, author of Behind the Barbed Wire: The History of Naval Weapons Station Concord. I saw him present this program in December and enjoyed it very much.

We are also going to ask a representative of the U.S. Geological Survey to speak to us about earthquakes in the Bay Area, specifically in the East Bay. The tentative program title is "What's Shakin', Pinole?" (Thanks to Norma Martinez-Rubin for the title).

#### **MUSEUM UPDATE**

There was significant progress in the last quarter of 2017, most significantly the receipt of the Pinole History Museum's 501(c)(3) status from the Internal Revenue Service.

The Pinole History Museum Board of Directors (separate from the society's board of directors) is planning for the restoration of the interior of the Faria House and turning it into "a contemporary museum in a classic home."

The City of Pinole, the museum's partner in this project, has presented markups of the Faria house floor plans to several architectural firms in the Bay Area.


We are waiting for proposals from the architects so we'll know how much the project will cost, how much money the museum will have to raise, and how long it will take before the museum opens.

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## PHS SELLING NEW BOOK ABOUT EAST BAY HILLS


he Pinole Historical Society has a limited number of copies of the new book, East Bay Hills: A Brief History, published by Arcadia Publishing. Here's a description of the book:


Like the mist rising from San Francisco Bay encircles the towering redwoods, the little-known legends of the East Bay Hills enrich a glorious history.

## In memoriam

#### MARIE LORRAINE PEREIRA December 25, 1919 – December 27, 2017 Age 98

Lorraine celebrated her 98th birthday at her Pinole home, where she passed two days later. She was a 70-year member of St. Joseph's Church.

Lorraine was born in Vallejo and attended St. Vincent's School. She worked at Mare Island Naval Hospital. During the Port Chicago explosion in 1944, she assisted in the base recovery helping the injured. She later worked 28 years as a bookkeeper for Three Brothers' Hardware in Pinole.

After her retirement she did charitable work, crocheting blankets for Children's Hospital in Oakland and volunteering at Juan Crespi Middle School.

Lorraine enjoyed membership in Portuguese organizations such as the SPRSI, LUZO, and UPPEC. She was also an active member of St. Anthony's Society, Redmen, and Pocahontas. Lorraine married Lawrence Pereira in 1944, He died in 1966.

Lorraine loved the Pereira family's ranching history in Pinole Valley as well as Pinole's history. Her wit and always friendly smile will be missed by all who knew her.

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# Back in the day

## **REACHING WAY BACK**

grew up in the Pinole of the 1940s. This time of year, I reminisce about memorable events that fixed themselves into my youthful memories. Some are pleasant and some very unpleasant.

I fondly recall the 1947 Christmas tree and bonfire rallies the cities of Pinole and Hercules held for their children.

This after-Christmas tradition was eagerly looked forward to as the "kiddies' big event." Both municipalities and their civic organizations sponsored these events.


There was a large community turnout, comparable today to the colorful lighting of Pinole's Christmas tree to open the holiday season. Hercules people assembled near the old box factory by the bay. Pinole's rally was held down in the civic square. Years later, both were combined into one and held at Fernandez Park.

After Christmas, kids gathered discarded Christmas trees from all over town and stored them on the old tennis court next to the civic center. I remember kids dragging huge trees behind their bicycles. We even stole trees from our Hercules competitors so we could have a bigger bonfire.

The big night came when the Pinole Fire Department lit the huge pile of trees in blazing glory. We enjoyed a massive bonfire and wiener roast, which was followed by games and dancing. It was a grand community celebration to the end of Christmas. Today, we would probably have broken air quality and recycling regulations.

A more ominous event during World War II shook up my young life on a December morning in 1944. A thunderous explosion rocked our Tennent Avenue home, blowing in the front door, shattering all of our windows and causing my sister to let out screams louder than the blast itself. Our Christmas tree and all our decorations were destroyed.

The nitro plant at the

nearby Hercules Powder Company had blown up, sending shock waves all the way to San Francisco. Not a window in Pinole was spared; two workers were killed and 25 injured.

The dresser mirror in Miss Alice Lindhome's house in Pinole exploded in her face causing severe eye injuries. Mary Moses and Doris Molica, who worked at the Hercules Clubhouse, suffered life-threatening

injuries when the roof caved in. Miss Moses had a skull fracture and Miss Molica severe head lacerations.

All police and fire departments rushed to the scene and roped off the plant. A stream of cars driven by frightened wives and

families of Hercules workers rushed by our home on their way to Hercules to see if their loved ones had survived. Young Charles Hutt, 15, peddled his bicycle all the way from Rich-

way from Richmond to see if his father, who worked at the nitro plant, was all right. Unfortunately, his father had been killed.

And where was I when the disaster struck? My mother was giving me a bath in a large tub in the kitchen. The tub was under the dish cabinet, and the doors flew open, showering me with dishes and salt-and-pepper shakers.

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

We lived with broken glass for a long time. The Hercules Powder Company paid for all damages and repairs. We got a better front door with a little peephole compartment to look out.

I learned that day that our powder-company neighbor had a dangerous side. So many of our family and neighbors worked there that the tragedies of future explosions always impacted the close-knit, small community.

Many fathers and friends died in another explosion in the 1950s. We had to cancel our Boy Scout meeting in respect to them.

I will never forget the looks of terror and desperation on the faces of wives driving by our house, praying their

husbands and sons were still alive. The guards at the gate stopped them from the disaster site and it was a heart-breaking scene of tears and anguish while they waited.

It was always a risk

working at the Hercules plant. My grandfather, who worked at the acid plant, had to quit due to sever face burns. My father and uncle both worked near the dangerous dynamite bunkers, and during World War I, my mother loaded powder into artillery shells at the plant.

Most of the residents of Pinole and Hercules were dependent upon and wed to the Hercules Powder Works in some way. **MEMORIAL DONATIONS**


