PHS MEETING FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 15, WILL EXPLORE SHARED HISTORY BETWEEN PINOLE AND HERCULES

he Pinole Historical Society has two significant events of public interest during the first quarter of 2013.

The first, on Friday, February 15, is the PHS quarterly membership meeting, featuring a joint program with the Hercules Historical Society entitled "A Tale of Two Cities."

This program, from 6:30-8 p.m. in conference rooms 2A and 2B of the Kaiser

Medical Office Building on Pinole Valley Road, will explore the shared history between Pinole and Hercules, a history based on geography and a heritage of mutual need and cooperation.

Both cities were part of the 18,000-acre

El Rancho Pinole land grant in the early 1800s, and both grew into cities, Hercules in 1900, and Pinole in 1903. The program will focus on the interaction

> and cultural ties of the communities. The mutual need for water, schools, and jobs will be highlighted, with oral histories and a Powerpoint presentation. The program is free and open to the public.

participation on the Contra Costa Library system from 1-3 p.m. on Saturday, March 16, at the El Sobrante Library. The PHS will be one of several West County historical societies presenting short histories of the libraries in their communities.

How about important athletic events, such as a high-school football, basketball, baseball, softball, or volleyball game?

Perhaps you have film of an important event that took place in Fernandez Park, or a ribbon cutting or an event that has a place in Pinole's history — such as the 1958 flood?

We're looking for any video or film you have — VHS, Beta, camcorder, DV tape, 8mm, Super 8mm, 16mm, 35mm, motion picture.



Nearly everyone has taken home movies. That makes everyone who has taken film a historian.

We want to collect, digitize, catalog, and preserve old movies on DVD (and whatever formats are to come) to exhibit, educate, and entertain.

The PHS will share these videos on a film archive that we will establish, similar to the The Pioneers Film Archive on YouTube created by the California Pioneers of Santa Clara (www.youtube.com/sccpioneers).

Film connects with the past in a unique way. It's immersive, educational, and entertaining. It's a way to get young people interested in history.



ROSIE THE RIVETER/WWII HOME FRONT NATIONAL HISTORICAL PARK

Free collectible cards teach young travelers about little-known stories

Trading cards have been popular with kids for generations, featuring everything from sports figures to movie stars. Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park in Richmond is now offering visitors the chance to earn four trading cards representing the civil rights history of this park,

as well as four more from Port Chicago Naval Magazine National Memorial.

The cards are part of a series of 550 Civil War to Civil Rights cards available at participating national parks throughout the United States.

To "earn" a trading card, children of all ages may



The recent Civil War Sesquicentennial and the 50th Anniversary of the Civil Rights Movement provided the impetus for the creation of the trading card series. The goal is to encourage younger visitors to learn about the nation's past through visiting their national parks, to celebrate the strides we have made

as a nation, and to reflect on how past events continue to affect their own lives.

Be among the first to earn these newest cards! Please note: All cards must be earned in person, through a visit to the park.

The National Park Service cannot honor requests to mail sets of cards; however.

participate in a ranger-led tour or answer a question about their visit to the park.

"The trading cards are vehicles for telling some lesser-known stories – including the stories of civilians, women, African-Americans and Japanese-Americans," said Superintendent Tom Leatherman.

"The cards are a great way to engage kids with our history as a nation, both here at Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front, at Port Chicago Naval Magazine, and throughout the United States."

The cards also provide an incentive to families to visit all parks which offer the cards.

Each trading card tells a little-known story, but collectively the cards describe the struggles the nation has endured to achieve freedom and equality for all.

TRADITION OF CHILDREN'S ARTWORK CONTINUES AT ROSIE THE RIVETER MARITIME CENTER

School-aged children invited to join a ranger for arts and crafts

(Richmond, CA) – Join the National Park Service for a free, fun, family day on **Saturday**, **February 16**, at the historic Maritime Center in Richmond.

The building was built in 1943 as the Maritime Child Development Center, a federally funded lchildcare center to serve the families of shipyard workers. Today it is one of more than a dozen sites that make up Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park.

At 11 a.m., adult visitors are invited to tour the Maritime Center's preschool classroom lexhibit and learn about the center's innovative wartime curriculum, and the role that childcare facilities played in the WWII home front effort by enabling mothers to join the workforce. The tour begins in the lobby and lasts one hour.

A family program, led by a ranger, will follow the tour, from 12-2 p.m., including arts and crafts for school-age children. A parent or guardian must attend with the child.

Children who attended the Maritime Child Development Center during WWII worked with many different art materials—tempera paints, clay, cut paper collage, linoleum prints, and leather. Children are invited to continue the tradition of art making during this fun afternoon.


The Maritime Center is located at 1014 Florida Avenue, at the corner of Harbour Way in Richmond. Street parking nearby is generally easy to find. The National Park's Service's exhibit is only accessible by guided tour or by appointment, so don't miss this opportunity.

During the event, visitors will also be able to view a small exhibit on playground design in the Bay Area. The exhibit was originally curated by Susan Solomon for the Harold E. Jones Child Study Center at UC Berkeley. The center was designed in 1960 by architect Joseph Esherick, in collaboration with Catherine Landreth. Ms. Landreth also served as a consultant on the design of the Maritime Child Development Center earlier in her career.



You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market-we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.






