WCCUSD to install at Collins School

Bell from the Old School rescued

he bell that rang generations of Pinole school children to class at Pinole-Hercules School #1 (The School on the Hill) has been rescued by the Pinole Historical Society, repaired and repainted by the West Contra Costa Unified School District, and will be installed soon in a prominent loca-

tion at Collins Elementary School.

The bell is all that remains from the school, which taught Pinole and Hercules children from 1906 to 1966. It was demolished in 1968.

The bell was severely damaged after being left outside at Pinole Middle School for decades.

The PHS asked the WCCUSD to

store and repair the bell, and install it at a location where it would contribute to the city's rich history.

The PHS thanks the WCCUSD's Charles Ramsey, Dr. Bruce Harter, Wendell Greer, Luis Freese, and Jim Edward for preserving the bell.

The PHS is planning a dedication ceremony.

PHS BRINGS PINOLE'S HISTORY TO ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

or the last four years, the Pinole Historical Society has brought the history of Pinole into the city's fourth-grade classrooms, courtesy of a fascinating program PHS co-founder and board member George Vincent conceived that captivates the children.

George, who taught at Ellerhorst Elementary school most of his adult life, has a unique way of relating to students, using a combination of purposely corny jokes and interesting tidbits about childrens' lives 100 years ago to create an engaged audience.

He uses old photos and arti-


facts from a bygone era to teach children about our city's history.

Schools teach California history in the fourth grade, but not local history. This program is part of the society's outreach program, a "museum on wheels" approach to bringing history to the public in the absence of a museum.

service on the board.






You may purchase one or more of these books from us at the Pinole Farmers' Market—we'll be there every other Saturday through the end of December.





Two documentaries being shown at Rosie the Riveter/ WWII Home Front National Historical Park

new documentary film called "The War At Home" is being shown daily at the Rosie the Riveter/WWII Home Front National Historical Park. The 25-minute film screens hourly at the park's Visitor Education Center, starting at 11 a.m.. The last screening is at 4 p.m. It's shown seven days a week.

"The War At Home," produced in collaboration between the National Park Service and Signature



Communications, uses oral histories, archival materials, and personal diaries to illustrate the diversity and complexity of the World War II homefront experience, from the perspective of a number of real people who lived in different cities across the United States.

Another 16-minute documentary film, "Home Front Heroes," which outlines the history of defense manufacturing in Richmond, during World War II, is also screened regularly, alternating with "The War At Home."

5TH ANNUAL HOME FRONT FILM FESTIVAL PRESENTS 6 WWII-ERA FILMS ABOARD THE SS RED OAK VICTORY

he Rosie the Riveter/World War II Home Front National Historical Park and the Richmond Museum of History Association will present the 5th Annual WWII

Home Front Film Festival on Thursdays in June, July and August, 2013. The film festival will feature popular, full-length movies that were shown on the Home Front during the WWII period.

Six movies will be screened aboard the SS Red Oak Victory, a beautifully restored ship built in Richmond during World War II. The ship is located in historic Shipyard #3, where thousands of Americans labored to build 747 ships over the course of the war. Ship address: 1337 Canal Blvd., Berth 6A, in Richmond. Boarding is at 6:30 pm and the films begin at 7. There is a donation of \$5 to board the ship and enjoy ship exhibits prior to the film. Please note: the ship is not ADA accessible. Visitors must be able to climb gangplank (40 feet, of stairs with railings) and steep steps once aboard ship.

The movies include:

June 13: In Which We Serve (1941). Starring Noel Coward and John Mills. Stories of courage and reflections of the home front.

June 27: The Wolf Man (1941). Starring Claude Rains and Lon Chaney. The classic horror movie with a surprising connection to WWII.

July 11: Casablanca (1942). Starring Humphrey

Bogart and Ingrid Bergman: This "viewer's choice" film is being reprised this year, as it was chosen by the festival audience as a favorite from the last four years. Casablanca is considered the greatest romance film of all time.

July 25: Lifeboat (1944). Written by John Steinbeck and directed by Alfred Hitchcock: This film was also a top audience choice, full of twists and turns only Hitchcock can deliver.

August 8: The Story of G.I. Joe (1945). Starring Burgess Meredith and Robert Mitchum. As WWII came to an end, this film was a realistic look at what it was like to serve as a solider in the European Theater. It's based on the life of the famed war correspondent Ernie Pyle.

August 22: Dear Ruth (1946). starring William Holden and Joan Caulfield. Based on the 1944 play, a borrowed identity has hilarious consequences.

Popcorn and refreshments will be available for purchase. A National Park Service ranger will provide an introduction to the films in the context of the WWII Home Front.


