In memoriam

EDWARD L.H. “SWEDE” JOHANNESSEN

December 3, 1919 – January 1, 2017

Age 97

Edward “Swede” Johannesen, a longtime Pinolean whose life mirrored the history of the city for much of the 20th century, died January 1. He was 97.


Ed was born in San Luis Obispo on December 3, 1919, was raised in Pinole, and graduated from Richmond Union High School in 1937, where he was a member of the undefeated, unscored upon 1935 football team.

Ed went on to attend Stanford University from 1937-41, where he was an offensive and defensive lineman on Stanford’s football team. He played under coaches Tiny Thornhill and Clark Shaughnessy and was a member of Stanford’s famous 1940 team “The Wow Boys” that was undefeated, beat Nebraska in the Rose Bowl, and was voted national champions. He graduated in 1941.

Pinole’s population was around 700 when Ed and his family moved to Pinole in 1925. They rented two houses before buying an old house near St. Joseph’s Church. The family’s first rental was close to the Faria ranch.

“I spent most of my time on the ranch, where Bill Faria became more like a father to me,” Ed wrote to the Pinole Historical Society last summer.

“He and my husband Clarence (Faria) were like brothers,” says Stella (Freitas) Faria. “They milked cows together at Bill Faria’s ranch. Ed and I corresponded regularly. In one of his notes he wrote about how he’d wake up Clarence in the morning to go milk cows because Clarence didn’t have an alarm clock.



“Ed and my husband, Harold, lived across the street from each other,” says Celeste (Freitas) Silvas, Stella’s sister. “Ed was a very, very nice person. He was friendly with everyone and would help anybody. Everybody looked up to him.”

Ed graduated from the California Maritime Academy in 1943. Before he shipped out for the remainder of the World War II years, Ed married his childhood sweetheart, Juliet Pasquini.

Through 1946, Ed served as a deck officer aboard troop transports and freighters in the Atlantic, Pacific, and Mediterranean war zones.

After the war, Ed resumed working for Chevron, where he had begun working during summers while at Stanford.

During his 48-year career at Chevron, Ed earned a master’s degree in economics from the UC-Berkeley in 1950. His book, *The Hawaiian Labor Movement: A Brief History*, was used as a textbook for many years. He retired

in 1985 as the Manager of Corporate Labor Relations.

“Ed was proud that he came from a very poor family and went to Stanford on a football scholarship and ended up at the top of the heap at Chevron,” says Stella.

“Clarence ended up being the Superintendent of Major Projects for Chevron. Ed was proud that he and Clarence started out as poor kids from large families in Pinole and ended up with good jobs with Chevron.”

Ed’s expertise in his field led to his service on the Labor Relations Committees of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the California Chamber of Commerce, and the National Association of Manufacturers. He was also a member of the Industrial Labor Relations Committee of the National Petroleum Refiners Association.

His daughter, Judy, who shared the same birthday with her dad for 69 years, survives Ed, along with grandchildren Nicole Bowers (Todd) and Justin Lewis (Adrian); great-grandchildren, Colin and Rhys Bowers and Ethan and Erin Lewis; and numerous nieces and nephews.

His wife of 70 years, Juliet, and his siblings Roald, Ella, Ruth, and Frances, predeceased Ed.

Ed wrote the conclusion to this obituary himself:

“I want to say farewell and thanks to all my friends, relatives and business associates who have helped make this life a happy, interesting, and worthwhile experience.

“I extend my fond hope that we shall meet again sometime, somewhere in the Great Unknown!”





RICHMOND MUSEUM OF HISTORY EXHIBITION HOW WORLD WAR I CHANGED RICHMOND MARCH 11 – JUNE 29

The Richmond Museum of History will host the exhibition “How World War I Changed Richmond” in the museum’s Seaver Gallery, 400 Nevin Avenue, Richmond.

The exhibit features dozens of World War I-related artifacts with connections to Richmond. Many artifacts have been in the museum collection more than 50 years and will be on display for the first time.

The exhibit commemorates the centennial of the United States involvement in the Great War and is one of the few events marking the centennial in the San Francisco Bay Area. It features stories of Richmond residents from all walks of life who were involved in World War I, both at home and on the front.

Visitors to the exhibit will learn how World War I shaped the City of Richmond to be ready to face the challenges of the World War II Home Front and beyond.

PETTICOAT PROGRESSIVES AND LOST MASTERS: WOMEN ARTISTS OF AQUATIC PARK

10:30 AM Meets in the Argonaut Hotel lobby, 495 Jefferson Street. No fee.

Viewed from a satellite perspective, Aquatic Park stands out from other nearby structures along the waterfront. Discover the unique aspects of this historic district's architectural and artistic design and learn about one of the first political contests in San Francisco which pitted the organized women's vote against the captains of industry. Rangers will also explore the "lost" women artists who worked on the Aquatic Park Bathhouse Building for the New Deal's Federal Artists Project.

SUFFRAGETTE MARCH AND LADIES SALON

Turn back the clock to 1901 and experience a costumed reenactment of a suffragette march in support of votes for women. At 2:00pm, join a salon of Victorian women as they discuss issues of the day. Come voice your opinion!

Alaska Packers Association days, she passed into twilight career as the side-show pirate ship, the Pacific Queen, a third-rate shrine to dime attractions and Hollywood sets.

As the last West Coast sailing ships disappeared, the history and identity of the Age of Sail lost its root in workaday reality and entered the realm of story and fable.

Rose Kissinger presided over this ship of our collective imaginations and came to be the last individual owner and longest shipboard resident of the Pacific Queen.

At the heart of this story is the rise of the Maritime Museum itself and San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park.

What's in a name? Balclutha by any other name is still Balclutha.

Explore this little known aspect of women's history at sea, and learn how technology and education pushed the boundaries of Victorian gender relations at the end of the Age of Sail.

Though women in the Victorian era usually suffered severe restrictions on what society thought were proper roles for them, the mold was occasionally broken and their talents shined through.

Join park rangers for this table-talk demonstration and explore the art of celestial navigation and the experiences of two exceptional women, Eleanor Creesy and Mary Patten, on board the famous American clipper ships Flying Cloud and Neptune's Car.

**WOMEN IN THE WORLD WAR II HOME FRONT

The World War II Home Front fundamentally transformed the industrial workforce and laid the groundwork for many subsequent social justice efforts, including the Civil Rights movement and second wave feminism.

This slideshow will look at women workers in the Kaiser Richmond shipyards and explore some of the ways they helped win the war and expand the democratic principles that war was fought for.

Presenter: Lincoln Cushing, historian and archivist for Kaiser Permanente, the health plan whose roots were forged in West Coast WWII shipyards.

**FANNIE FARMER AND THE SAILING SHIPS THAT
BROUGHT THE WORLD TO HER KITCHEN**

In 1896, the Boston Cooking school published the Fannie Farmer Cookbook, the first of its kind to take a rigorous, scientific approach to cooking and a nod "...to English thoroughness, French art and Arabian hospitality."

These and other details of Fannie Farmer's world and cosmopolitan influences will be explored on board Balclutha, an 1886 sailing vessel built during the time when cities such as Boston traded goods from around Cape Horn and beyond.

Overcoming physical, social and political constraints, Fannie Farmer's personal strength and integrity, poise and elegance in the face of adversity helped her become one of the most influential women in the past 150 years.

Flag Holidays

Every year we see more American flags being displayed for community and special events.

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress passed the Flag Resolution which stated: "Resolved, that the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Francis Hopkinson, of New Jersey, a naval flag designer and a signer of the Declaration of Independence, designed the 1777 flag.

The original flag has been modified 26 times and was unchanged with its 48 stars for 47 years, beginning with Arizona's and New Mexico's admittance to the Union on July 4, 1912. On January 3, 1959, when Alaska was admitted to the Union, the number of stars increased to 49. On August 21, 1959, when Hawaii was admitted to the Union, the flag showed 50 stars.


LOCAL HISTORY BOOKS AVAILABLE FROM THE PINOLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY






